

## Dr. Calvert Johnson A Narrated Recital on Minority Composers

Monday, April 24, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. Good Shepherd Episcopal Church (211 Franklin Road, Lookout Mtn.) A reception will follow.

Calvert Johnson is the Charles A. Dana Professor Emeritus of Music and College Organist Emeritus, Agnes Scott College, and Organist, First Presbyterian, Marietta, Georgia. At Agnes Scott, he taught courses in Sacred Music, Women in Music, Music before 1750, as well as organ and harpsichord lessons. Johnson earned the doctorate and master's in organ performance at Northwestern University, where he studied with Karel Paukert, and the bachelors at Kalamazoo College, where he studied with Danford Byrens (organ, harpsichord) and Mary Beth Birch (piano). Through the Fulbright-Hays programme he studied at Toulouse Conservatoire (Premier Prix) with Xavier Darasse. He also studied in Spain, Netherlands, Italy, Germany, Japan and Korea. Johnson has performed in Japan, Mexico, Honduras, and throughout the USA and Europe. He has recorded for the Albany, Calcante, and Raven labels. He is known for his performances of music by composers from under-represented groups (Blacks, Asians, Hispanics and women) as well as early music. His recording Chicago Renaissance Woman: Florence B. Price Organ Works won the third annual prize by the Society for American Music. Hildegard, ClarNan, Wayne Leupold Editions, and G. K. Hall publish his editions of music by women. He has published many editions of keyboard music by French women composers of the 18th and 19th centuries. Author of critically acclaimed volumes on Spain, Italy, England, and Netherlands (Historical Organ Techniques and Repertoire: An Historical Survey of Organ Performance Practices and Repertoire, Wayne Leupold Editions), Johnson has performed and lectured at many colleges and chapters of the American Guild of Organists (AGO). Immediate past national Treasurer and Past Dean of the Atlanta and Tulsa chapters of the AGO, Johnson's bio is in the International Who's Who in Music and Who's Who in Music in America. He has been President of the Southeastern Historical Keyboard Society, Chair of the Board of the ArtReach Foundation, Chair of the Committee on Cultural Inclusion of the College Music Society, and Chair of the annual MLK, Jr. Concert of the Anti-Racism Commission of the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta. He is currently Chair of the Knowledge [lecture] Series at Big Canoe, Georgia, and co-chair of the Black Bear Project, devoted to "Living in Harmony with Wildlife in the North Georgia Mountains." ## From the Dean

#### Lenten "Discipline"

Last night, we had a guest pastor step in to lead our Ash Wednesday Worship Service while our regular pastor was out-of-town. The choir had just descended from the balcony to receive ashes first, so we could go back upstairs and sing while the congregation received their ashes. Just as we were about to line up, the pastor calmly turned to face the congregation and asked, "Does anyone know where the ashes are?" I immediately panicked! I knew I had seen the ashes in the administrator's office at some point, but I wasn't sure. I ran out of the sanctuary and desperately began searching. Meanwhile, the pastor "vamped" at the altar, chatting with worshippers as if he had planned the whole thing.

Once I'd found the ashes and made my way back to the balcony, I reflected on how the pastor dealt with the situation versus how I dealt with it. I was sweating profusely and practically hyperventilating. I was scrambling, trying to figure out how to adapt the rest of the worship service to squeeze the ashes in somewhere else, worried about the choir's disappointment about not getting to sing the anthem they prepared, and so on. Meanwhile, the pastor was as cool as a cucumber, completely un-phased. Deep down, I was insanely jealous! I've always envied people who seem unflappable—handling bumps in the road like water off a duck's back. Regardless of my level of preparation, my heart rate triples whenever something doesn't happen the way I plan.

Every Lenten season, my husband and I deprive ourselves of the typical luxuries—meat, sweets, caffeine, social media, etc. I also try to take on something that's character building, such as fostering friendships, taking time to exercise or relax, or communicating only face-to-face (instead of via text or email). This Lent, I'm hoping to cut myself some slack and try to roll with the punches a little better. I'm not sure how I'm going to do that yet, but it's a work in progress! Whatever you choose to do or not do during this Lenten season, take advantage of the next forty days to reflect, reevaluate, repent (literally, change direction), reset. If something unexpected happens as a result, don't panic—just roll with it and cut yourself some slack. Everybody needs a little forgiveness!

## **Available Positions:**

Grace Episcopal Church in Chattanooga seeks part-time Interim Parish Musician(s) to cover organist and choral responsibilities until a long-term Director of Music is appointed, following the arrival of a new Rector later in 2017. Choral responsibilities include preparing music and directing the parish choir at weekly rehearsals and services (September - May), as well as selecting hymns and anthems for worship in conjunction with the parish clergy. Organist responsibilities include accompaniment for the principle Sunday Eucharist and one weekly choral rehearsal (September - May). Additional duties consist of providing music for occasional services such as Holy Week liturgies, quarterly evensongs, and weddings/funerals as available. Administrative functions may include oversight of organ, harpsichord, and piano maintenance and of the music library. These responsibilities may be divided into one or two positions, depending on skills, interest, and availability. The education requirement is at least a Bachelor's degree. Familiarity with Episcopal worship or similar liturgical traditions is preferred. Required weekly hours are flexible (up to 18 hours), and compensation will be competitive and commensurate to education, skill level, and experience. The Interim Parish Musician(s) WILL be eligible to apply for the permanent position(s) when posted. # Young Organists Encouraged to Apply for Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival

(Minneapolis, MN) Lutheran Music Program has selected Kenneth Miller to serve as the Regina Holmen Fryxell and Patricia Schad Leege Chapel Organist at the 2017 Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival (LSM) from June 25<sup>th</sup> to July 23<sup>rd</sup> on the campus of Valparaiso University in Valparaiso, Indiana. Miller currently serves as Assistant Professor of Church Music and Organist and Choirmaster of the Chapel of the Apostles at the School of Theology at the University of the South in Sewanee, TN.

As a member of the artistic faculty, Miller will maintain a private organ studio, teach the Introduction to Pipe Organ elective class, and serve as a member of the LSM worship team. In addition to serving as primary organist for all LSM worship services, Miller will also perform as a soloist and with the LSM Bach Cantata.
