

From the Dean

“I just don’t have time for _____.”

The busy-ness of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter are behind us. The school year is coming to an end and, before we know it, summer will be in full swing. Hard to believe, isn’t it?

Inevitably, what happens next, when we find ourselves with a little extra time on our hands? We fill it up FAST! I’m just as guilty as the next person for doing this. In fact, I am fully aware that I am the type of person that thrives on being busy. Often, my feelings of self-worth come from my ability to crush a to-do list in record time, and if I’m not as productive as I had hoped (regardless of the reasons why), I beat myself up over it. Perhaps it’s my generation, my gender, my chosen profession, my stage in life, or a combination of factors that has made me this way. But, I know I’m not alone, am I?

I’m a bit busier these days than in years past because, for the first time, I’ve made a commitment to volunteering on a regular basis. Since moving to Chattanooga three years ago, I’ve joined several organizations and served on multiple boards, most recently the Chattanooga AGO executive board. But, my schedule now is no more or less hectic than it was before. I can’t pinpoint exactly why these priorities have suddenly come into focus, other than my coming to the realization that I have always wanted to contribute to my church, my network of mom supporters, my academic colleagues, and my fellow church musicians in a volunteer capacity and I had yet to commit to it.

Ultimately, what I’ve learned is that making a commitment to something that is meaningful, but not technically required of you, isn’t about having time to do it. It’s about MAKING time to do it. Often, these priority-based choices don’t make a lot of sense on the surface. For example, my family moved to Chattanooga with no place to live and no job prospects, but we knew that coming here was the best decision for us because it meant we could spend more time together as a family. We gave up everything in our lives that was no longer a priority to make time for what we felt was important. We kept saying to each other, “Life is too short for us to be spending so much time/money/energy doing _____.” (I’m sure you can fill in the blank with your own reasons.) So, we took a leap of faith and trusted that our priorities would guide us to make the right decision.

Now is the time of the year for our AGO chapter to nominate and elect our future board members. Our chapter membership is sixty members strong, and we are fortunate to be amongst a thriving and supportive musical community in Chattanooga! However, over the past year since I have been dean, our member engagement has been an ongoing issue. Our attendance, communication, feedback, and enthusiasm has been less than stellar, and I don’t know what to do about that. Despite the best efforts of our executive board and veteran members, these issues have not improved. Not only am I struggling to come up with members who are willing to either serve on the executive board or on various committees, I can’t even put together a nominating committee to create a slate of officers for next year. Forgive my candid tone, but I feel that I need to be completely honest. I’m genuinely concerned about the future of our AGO chapter.

Given the current climate of our national organization and the recent changes put forth by the FTC, we need committed volunteers now more than ever. The recent limitations put on our members is discouraging, to say the least. The aging demographic of our members, the decrease in organ student enrollment and full-time employment opportunities, the lack of universities and churches able and/or willing to compensate us

proportionally to our education and experience—these factors have contributed to a generally low morale amongst AGO members all over the country.

Our passion, our profession, our calling does not have to be destined to disintegrate. We all say we want to help grow the AGO. However, to actually do that, each one of us needs to commit to making time for the AGO. We're all busy, I get that. We all have commitments that we've made both willingly and unwillingly that we must honor. We are all in different phases of our lives and have different priorities. All that I ask is that you consider setting aside an amount of time, no matter how small, to contribute to the purpose and the mission of the AGO in Chattanooga—whether that means serving on a committee, committing to a board position, hosting an event, or reaching out to fellow members to invite them to stay engaged with our chapter. ANY amount of time you make for us will be appreciated and beneficial, not just for our current members but for the future of our chapter, our national organization, and our profession.

Young Organists Encouraged to Apply for Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival
