#### **From the Dean**

#### "2018 Re-Solutions"

As many of you know, I am currently unemployed, having gone from four part-time jobs to now only one quarter-time position. From a professional standpoint, 2017 was a very difficult year for me. I faced a disproportionate amount of unfairness, disappointment, and discrimination. Through this experience, I came to realize there is very little (nothing, actually, apart from hiring a lawyer) that I can do to "officially" report unprofessional/illegal behavior or prevent it from being perpetuated. I feel that, despite my best efforts, my voice has not been heard, and my rights have not been upheld. Unfortunately, after reaching out to the AGO and other denominational and academic organizations looking for support, I discovered they cannot support me due to their own legal limitations. I absolutely do not want anyone to have to experience what I have. However, I question whether the tremendous effort and energy I've put into publicizing and preventing discrimination (gender, age, race, education, etc.) in the workplace makes any real difference. So many people have said to me, "This is the culture and you just need to accept it," or "Your standards are too high; you need to compromise more," or "You can't expect to be compensated what you think you are worth." My favorite one is, "You're too passionate about what you do; it's just a job, so don't take it personally." Since when is being called by God to be a church musician or educator just a "job?" It's not just what I do – it's who I am. Having not done it on a Sunday morning for over a month, I can say with certainty that I don't feel at all like myself. Sitting in the pew feels wrong, and listening the organ or singing a hymn brings me to tears.

The reason I say all of this is two-fold. First, I'm sure all of you have experienced some type of unfairness or injustice in a work situation, whether it's for a church, school, or any place of business. Depending on your age, your education, your experience, your personality, etc., you made the decision to either walk away quietly or to

fight for what you believed to be right. I've done both, so I have no right to judge. Either way, I hope you walked away from that experience having learned a valuable lesson. Good or bad, right or wrong, every failure is practice for success.

The second reason is for me, and all of you, to begin this new year with a feeling of optimism and hope. I have finally achieved enough distance from the trauma I experienced to gain some perspective. I'm working to reconcile, to love, and to forgive – not just the people who hurt me, but primarily myself. The church, and every job, is **IN** the world, even though we strive to make it not **OF** the world. One of my favorite theological terms is the word "liturgy" because it literally means work of the people. We constantly strive for perfection, but we will never attain it. Only God is perfect. But, because we "work" so hard to worship God the way we feel God deserves to be worshipped, our liturgy is good enough for God because it is the absolute best we can do.

So, what is your re-solution? How are you going to re-solve a problem this year? I say this to myself and to you: regardless of who supports or criticizes you, who appreciates you or who takes you for granted, who you've forgiven or who's forgiven you — you can learn from every experience and take that knowledge with you. One of my favorite authors and theologians, C.S. Lewis, said, "God allows us to experience the low points of life in order to teach us lessons that we could learn in no other way." As your dean, your colleague, and your friend, I am here to support you, and I know that you support me. For us, professional or personal hardships are typically one-in-the-same. The being said, we are all uniquely equipped to understand and empathize with each other. I encourage you to join me in this focus for the coming year. I hope you have a blessed new year.
