

From the Dean

BE CAREFUL!

I recently experienced an email scam directed at music teachers that was almost catastrophic, and I thought it would be helpful to share my experience with you, so you can keep an eye out if you see something similar. Back in April, I was contacted by someone through our news@agochattanooga.org email address requesting an organ teacher. I didn't realize until now that he did not ask for me by name. Out of habit, I began responding to his requests for information, giving him the benefit of the doubt. Here are the first few emails we exchanged – he used the name Albert Martinez. Albert's emails are in red, and my replies are in blue.

Hello,

My name is Albert Martinez and my wife name is Hannah Martinez,i got your email from (<u>http://www.agohq.org</u>)we need a music private instructor for my daughter maria, which is 15 years old if you are interested please confirm your Teaching Specialties and your area zip code. Thank You.

Albert,

Are you looking for an organ teacher? Where do you live?

Yes i'm looking for Organ teacher i live in Chattanooga, TN please i would also love you to confirm your area zip code for me.

My zip code is 37411. I teach organ only, both organ repertoire and service playing. I am also the president of our local organ guild. Thanks for your prompt reply, and for your interest in taking my lovely daughter on (Organ Lessons), i would like to give a brief introduction about my family, My name is Albert Martinez, my wife name is Hannah and my daughter name is Maria as i told you earlier, we are from Philippines and planning to live in United State as foreign investors soon, I and my wife are into Wine Production/Supply. and that is what we are coming to establish over there as well. We are presently blessed with one child and we are still planning for two more by God's grace. We are friendly and reasonable hard working family.

Maria is a very gentle and active girl, she like meeting new friends as well and has no allergies, she is excited in places like the beach, museum, zoological gardens etc. She is very obedient and doesn't get provoked so easily, she is 15 years. she really love music and she have alot of interest in music. and she is very intelligent and grab things easily.

kindly let me know your charges per hour/lesson in order for me to arrange for her payment before she travels down to for the lessons to commence. she will be having the lesson for eight month and Please Reply back on:

(1). Your charges per hour (2 times a week for 8 months):starting from 25th May 2018, until 20th January 2019 (2). The Day and time you will be available to teach him During the week:

Note: Please i will like to know if you will be coming to our house to give her a private lesson or you want her to come to your place. and i want to let you know that she is a beginner she doesn't know much about music and my daughter will be home schooled.AND PLEASE LET ME KNOW WHAT KIND OF ORGAN I CAN SEE FROM A RANGE OF \$300 TO \$400 SO SHE CAN USE IT FOR PRACTICE.

Albert,

My fee is \$50/lesson, so two lessons per week for eight months would be \$3,200. Typically, I ask that my students pay per month, which would be \$400.

I teach organ at the church where I am currently employed, which is in downtown Chattanooga. Your daughter can have access to the organ there any time that is convenient for her, if the church is available. I can teach most afternoons between 1:00-4:00 p.m., but Mondays, Wednesdays, or Fridays are preferable. Regarding a practice instrument for you to have at home, I would recommend purchasing an electronic keyboard to help Maria with her manual technique. If you'd rather have a practice organ with a full pedal board, it would cost you several thousand dollars. There are probably less expensive used electronic organs for sale online, but that would not be as helpful as having Maria practice on a pipe organ at my church or another church closer to your home. Most churches are thrilled to have a student come and practice the organ during the week, and it wouldn't cost you anything.

Thanks for your prompt reply and thanks so much again for your effort in working with us, the price, days and the time are perfect for us. please i will like to have your full names and address so that i can instruct my associate to send you a deposit for the first one month to secure the booking. Thank You.

My full name is Sarah Harr. My address is 3535 Dell Trail, Chattanooga, TN 37411.

When would you like to start? You mentioned something about May 25. I am available that afternoon, if that still works for your daughter.

Hello,

How are you doing? Hope fine. I was contacted by my associate today that the payment for the Deposit have been mailed to your address before he traveled out to Germany. here is the tracking number for the payment: 9405503699300236477828 you can track it on <u>http://www.usps.com/us</u>

So make sure you get back to me as soon as you receive these message, so I can be sure that you are aware that the payment is on the way and you are watching out for it.

Another important thing is, you should GET BACK TO ME IMMEDIATELY you receive the payment before you take it to your bank, so I can know you've received it.

NOTE: Please i'm sorry to inform you that our coming and meeting date and has changed to 15th of June 2018, we are sorry for the delay, so you are starting your job on that date.

Thanks so much and I will be waiting to hear from you.

By this point, I was beginning to feel concerned about the legitimacy of this person's identity and intentions. His broken English and changing timeline, as well as the payment (i.e. secured deposit) he was sending, was suspicious. I kept telling myself – why would anyone go through this much trouble just to steal money, and, if his solicitation wasn't legitimate, how could he possibly know so much about the organ? After speaking to a few members of our chapter about it, and showing them the email thread, I decided that I would let Albert know that, despite his monetary commitment to organ lessons, I wasn't going to agree until I met him and his daughter and person. On May 21, I received a check in the mail, and it was made out for a significantly higher amount than we discussed. It appeared legitimate at first, but the check and the envelope had different names and addresses on them, none of which looked familiar. Here is how the conversation progressed once I received the check:

Albert,

I received your check today. Thank you.

I would prefer not to deposit your check until I've had the opportunity to meet your daughter, Maria, and either you or your wife in person, just to make sure that Maria will be happy working with me. Would it be possible to do that in the next week or two? We could meet for an organ lesson, or just to talk and get to know each other better. Please let me know what day and time work best for you to meet in person. Thank you so much,

Hi,

I just contacted my associate, and he accepted the fact that he was the one that misunderstood me concerning the instruction I gave to him as regards the amount he was supposed to send to you for the DEPOSIT. I am very sorry for this mistake Actually he was supposed to send you just the money for the DEPOSIT and send the rest of the money to our shipper here. This balance is required for the shipment of our furniture/fittings and all other interior components that we are transferring to our new house. These properties are now at the point of shipment and our shipper have been waiting for the money so he can ship our properties without delay.

What I want you to do now is to take the check to your Bank and deposit the payment in your account to get cash out, and just deduct money for the deposit and then let me know when the rest is in your hand so that I can provide you with the information that you will send the remaining amount to.

I haven't done anything with your check, so you can just go ahead and pay for what you need to pay for now. Once you're settled in Chattanooga, let's plan to meet with your daughter and we can set a lesson schedule. I don't need a deposit—I've got plenty of time to teach her, so you don't need to secure my services. Looking forward to hearing from you in June, Sarah

Please i will still need you to deposit the check because the rest of the money is needed for the shipment of our properties.

Albert has subsequently sent me several emails like the last one he sent, repeatedly asking me to deposit his check and withdraw cash for the difference to mail back to him. I became painfully aware that this had all been a scam, and despite my giving him the benefit of the doubt, I felt ignorant for letting it go as far as it did. I recently contacted the national AGO to ask them for advice, and this is the response I received:

Hello Ms. Harr,

We have had instances with scammers contacting classified ads sellers but not with the music teacher or substitute lists (or at least not to my knowledge). Scamming happens so unpredictably, we do not have a standard response procedure, however, I have forwarded your email to our webmaster and the Headquarters

Director. Coincidentally, we will likely engage new legal counsel in a matter of weeks, and I will also forward this matter to him for his advice. What can I say – be wary. I answer the general office email, and yes, certainly – the email scamming we receive is pervasive and seems to be getting bolder. Harold Calhoun

In the past week, I have reported this scam to the local police, the TBI, Homeland Security, and even the FTC. I haven't gotten any responses, but I felt I needed to make public what had happened in the hopes of decreasing the likelihood of it happening to someone else. My husband did some research, after we realized it was a scam, and he found a limitless number of instances on Google of the so-called "music teacher scam." The emails to potential victims were worded the EXACT same way as what Albert sent to me. I couldn't believe it! Thousands of music teachers across the country have experienced the exact same scam. At least I didn't cash the check – as much as I would have loved an extra \$4,000 this summer!

I have learned to be even more suspicious of any emails that show up in our general Chattanooga AGO inbox, as well as any that claim to be from the National AGO. I ask you to do the same. And, if you encounter a suspicious email or solicitation from someone you don't know, as for help from another AGO member. I am grateful for those who advised me and supported me in this process.

The Jacobs Organ Academy, July 15-20, is designed along the lines of a European organ academy. Participants will receive intensive instruction in organ performance while also having an opportunity to explore various other interests and related studies. The **JOA** offers a **track for college-aged** organ students, and a **pre-college track**, both tailored to offer organists a substantive weeklong summer education opportunity within the US. We are keeping enrollment low enough to afford all attendees a generous amount of time on our two major Fisk concert hall organs. There will also be opportunities to play the new <u>Paul Fritts organ</u>, <u>Opus 41</u>, at First Presbyterian Church.

The JOA offers instruction in technique and repertoire, church music, theory, and registration, as well as plenty of practice time, an organ crawl, masterclasses, concerts, a closing performance, and a little fun along the way. The **college-aged track** includes a specialized focus on specific repertoire: this year's topics are the music of J. S. Bach and his North German predecessors, and music since 1900. The German Baroque focus will lead to a performance on the Fritts organ, while the latter repertory includes a survey in a masterclass/performance setting. The **pre-college track** can accommodate experienced organists and newcomers to the instrument. We encourage **pianists** with an interest in organ to consider this as well; proficient pianists keen on learning to play the organ can expect to receive a thorough introduction to the instrument in a thoroughly stimulating environment. Our faculty, Janette Fishell, Vince Carr, and Chris Young, have decades of teaching experience, preparing students for the challenging and fruitful world of church music, performance, and teaching, and encouraging them to embrace excellence in all aspects of their musical lives. AVAILABLE POSITIONS

The First United Methodist Church of Dalton, Georgia seeks a part-time Music Associate/Accompanist for its dynamic and growing Music Ministry. Approximately 20 hours per week (which includes 10 hours onsite in rehearsals and worship services and 10 hours of planning and personal practice time.) Occasional meetings with the Minister of Music and/or Director of Children's Choirs may be requested as needed.

Most importantly, we are seeking a committed Christian with a positive, outgoing personality who is willing to serve as a "team player" as we seek to make disciples of Jesus Christ through the Ministry of Music.

Applicants must be proficient on both organ and piano and a comfortable with a wide range of musical styles. Our instruments include a new three manual, 50 rank Parkey pipe organ featured on the covers of both *The Diapason* (January 2017) and *The American Organist* (August 2017), three grand pianos, five octaves of

Schulmerich handbells and a Schulmerich Carillon.

Responsibilities will include:

1) Serving as accompanist for the Chancel Choir at regular Wednesday and special called rehearsals, 8:45 and 11:00 weekly Sunday worship services, and special seasonal services - Advent, Christmas Eve, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week and the annual Smiley Gregg Community Choir concert in August.

2) Serving as substitute choirmaster/organist in the absence of the Minister of Music.

3) Occasionally playing service music (preludes, offertories, communion meditations and postludes) and congregational hymns as requested by the Minister of Music.

4) Serving as accompanist for two Children's Choir rehearsals on Wednesday evenings (September-May) and for their monthly musical offerings in worship. Two musicals are also presented annually in early December and early May.

5) Accompanying the Youth Choir for Sunday evening rehearsals from 4:30-5:30 (September-May), for their monthly musical offerings in worship, and on its annual choir tour (usually the first week in June).

The Music Associate/Accompanist will report directly to the Minister of Music. Salary is currently \$20,000 annually.

CHATTANOOGA AGO ENDOWMENT FUND

The Chattanooga Chapter of The American Guild of Organists (AGO) is a member of an international professional association founded in 1896 by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York.
